Convention Garden Tours

Saturday: 5/13/06 (Select one)

Tour A: Private Gardens / Brookside Gardens

This tour will feature five private gardens in Suburban Maryland, all of which are less than 2 acres in size and located but a few minutes from one another. Admire different landscape approaches and the use of azaleas, rhododendrons and companion plants in the gardens of Bill and Janet Miller, Jane and Bob Kinzie, Diane and James Gregg, Nancy and Barry Bosworth, and Glenn and Nancy Thompson.

This tour includes a visit to a major public garden in Maryland, the 54-acre Brookside Gardens, an outstanding horticultural resource in our region. Brookside has eight separate gardens in its complex including a conservatory, rose garden, perennial garden, fragrance garden, aquatic garden, and a large azalea collection.

Tour Cost: \$38.00

Tour B: Baltimore & National Arboretum

The alternative tour for Saturday requires greater travel distances since we will head north to Baltimore to visit Harry Weiskittel's garden and Marshy Point Nursery, a large wholesale operation on the shores of the Chesapeake Bay specializing in rhododendrons and azaleas. We will also see the 4.5-acre woodland garden of Dr. Jerry Hudgens with his collection of rare native plants and wildflowers.

In the afternoon we return to Washington, D.C., to explore the 446-acre U. S. National Arboretum. The Arboretum has many notable collections including Ben Morrison's original azalea plantings on Mount Hamilton, the National Bonsai and Penjing Museum that houses one of the largest collections of dwarf trees in North America, the National Herb Garden, the Asian Valley, and the Gotelli dwarf conifer collection.

Tour Cost: \$38.00

Sightseeing in Washington, D.C.

Attendees or family members may wish to extend their stay on either side of convention to see the many museums, monuments, and other historic landmarks in our Nation's Capital. Sunday: 5/14/05

Tour C: Private Gardens / McCrillis Gardens

We offer only one tour on Sunday and it will feature some of the larger private gardens in the region, those in excess of 2 acres. We will also visit the 5-acre public McCrillis Gardens with its elegant shade garden and large azalea collection.

A major attraction on this tour is Ed and Mary Reiley's lovely 5-acre rhododendron garden, one of the most extensive in our region. Ed is past president of the ARS and has received its Gold Medal.

We will also visit the beautiful landscape of Norman and Jean Beaudry with their 2½-acre garden of rhododendrons, azaleas, maples, dwarf conifers and many companion plants, as well as the original garden of the late George Harding, one of the founders of the ASA. George Harding's grandson, Mike White, and his wife Deb operate an azalea nursery on the premises.

Monday - Tuesday: 5/15 – 5/16/05 Tour D: Blue Ridge Mountains (limit 100)

After the convention, we offer an overnight trip to the Blue Ridge Mountains of Virginia. Departing early Monday morning, we will serve a continental breakfast on the bus as we head out for the azalea garden of Phil and Frances Louer. Lunch will be a traditional southern meal at historic Michie Tavern in Charlottesville, followed by a tour of the house and gardens of Monticello, Thomas Jefferson's home.

In the afternoon, we will head south along the Blue Ridge Parkway, admiring mountain views and making occasional stops to see native azaleas and wildflowers in bloom. We will spend the night at the peaceful Peaks of Otter Lodge. Dinner will be on your own at the excellent Peaks of Otter Restaurant.

After breakfast at the Lodge the next morning, we will continue south to Roanoke to see the exquisite mountainside garden of Paul James. We will serve a box lunch on the bus as it heads back to Rockville via the Shenandoah Valley, returning Tuesday evening.

Due to space limitations at the lodge, this tour is limited to 100 people. Please register early and we encourage singles to find roommates. Tour costs include bus transportation, overnight lodging, entry fees, and four meals (2 Breakfasts, 2 Lunches).

Getting to the Convention:

By Car:

The DoubleTree Rockville is located in the northwest suburbs of Washington DC with easy access from the Capital Beltway (I-495), or Interstate I-270. Note that the DoubleTree offers complimentary underground parking for guests.

West or South: From I-270, take exit 4A, Montrose Road East. Turn left on Rockville Pike (Rt. 355 North) and continue to the hotel.

North or East: From the northern section of I-495 heading west, take Exit 34 / Route 355 North (Wisconsin Avenue / Rockville Pike). The hotel will be on the right.

By Public Transportation:

Three major airports serve the greater Washington DC region including BWI in Baltimore, MD, Reagan National (DCA) in Alexandria, VA, and Dulles International (IAD) in Chantilly, VA. Shuttle and taxi service are available from the airports, but people can also connect to the Metro Subway System. The Twinbrook Station on the Metro Red Line opens at the hotel parking lot. Both Amtrak and the MARC train serve Rockville.


Flower Show Photography & Art Contest:
